Historic District: Westfort

The San Antonio Conservation Society objects to the increase in density created by the four-structure development planned for 255 Brahan. This lot is located in the Westfort Historic District and lies within the area addressed by the Westfort Alliance Neighborhood Plan.

The 1997 Westfort Alliance Neighborhood Plan sought to "preserve and enhance the residential character of the neighborhood" and "promulgate land use and zoning policy [that] both preserves the character of the neighborhood. . . and is consistent with city programs and goals." The 2003 update to the neighborhood plan also stated that, "it is desired that single family houses that have been divided into apartments and multiple living units be restored to single-family use."

In 2016, the Society urged the City Council to support the individual landmark designation of the C.T. Boelhauwe house at 255 Brahan, which contributed both architecturally and historically to the Westfort neighborhood. The decision to deny landmark designation paved the way for demolition of what had originally been one single-family house, contradicting the goals set forth in the Westfort Alliance Neighborhood Plan.


Although the historic Arts and Crafts bungalow at 255 Brahan no longer exists to be restored to single-family use as recommended, there is no reason to compound the oversight that led to its loss by allowing four houses to be built in its place.
